SPRING ATHLETICS ROUNDUP

Buffalo State Athletics is thriving this spring with successful teams in women's softball, lacrosse, and men's volleyball. Honors athletes play prominent roles in each of these teams!

Softball: As of April 24th, the Bengals are 16-14 overall and 10-2 in their conference.

Senior psychology major Sarah Congelosi is an infielder for the Bengals. "The competitiveness of the sport and the team camaraderie," Congelosi said. "There's no better feeling than going on that field and giving it all you got with the teammates that you love."

During her four seasons with the team, Congelosi played in over 100 games, had 70+ runs, and had 215 fielding assists.

"I have been fortunate enough to coach a 16u team back at home for the last 2 years, I hope to continue coaching," Congelosi said. "Unfortunately... this is my last season of softball ever and it's going to be one of the hardest things I'll walk away from."

Lacrosse: As of April 24th, the Bengals are 11-6 overall, are 5-4 in their conference and aim to go deep in the upcoming SUNYAC championships.

Hazel Vitko-Woods is a freshman majoring in Communication Studies/ Media Production. She chose Buffalo State for its affordability, commuter culture, and her interest in lacrosse.

"I love the sport because it drives me to challenge myself while also achieving my goals," Vitko-Woods said.

Vitko-Woods plays at the Attack/Defense position for the Bengals. In her first season, she scored three goals, recovered seven loose balls, and participated in eight games, according to Buffalo State Athletics.

"I have always been a defender, but this year I play attack and have racked up a few career points, including some goals," Vitko-Woods said. "I never thought I could play attack until this year thanks to my coaches for boosting my confidence."

Men's Volleyball: The Bengals finished their season 21-14 overall, 6-0 in their conference, and won the AMCC Championship for the first time on April 12th.

Jackson Stang is a sophomore majoring in Physics and Mechanical Engineering. He has played volleyball for 10 years and currently plays as a setter. Stang was drawn to Buff State by coach Dan Miranda where he could join the new volleyball program and study his major.

"Some of our highlights so far have probably been beating highly ranked Wittenberg, Nazareth, and Thiel," Stang said. "Another major highlight was going 6-0 in conference play giving Coach Dan his 100th win."

This semester has been exciting for our Honors athletes, teams, and coaches, but it's not over yet. Continue to show your support for our Bengals!

HONORS ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT: Tracy Rose ('01)

Honors Program Alumni, Tracy Rose, graduated from Buffalo State in 2001 with a bachelor's degree in art and art education. Rose feels as though Buffalo State prepared her for the successful career she has had.

"I feel like everything I did literally from Buff State on prepared me for this position I am in, I am very happy," Rose said.

Rose still recalls the benefits of being in the Honors Program, like the wide range of classes throughout different departments, seeing the same people in each class, the collaborative nature, and deep dive research skills she gained.

"It was nice to be in class with the same people. Buff State is big to me - I came from a school that only had 88 kids in our graduating class. So, it was nice to see a consistent group when I felt like I was a small fish in a big pond," Rose said.

After graduating from Buffalo State Rose has worked for 23 years as an art teacher in several schools around Buffalo, with her focus being arts integration programs.



"My whole philosophy was if I can use art to teach the core subjects, I was going to do that," Rose said.

In 2013 Rose started working at school #33, The Bilingual Center. School #33 was doing a Reggio Emilia inspired program, where learning centered around child psychology. Rose worked there for six years until the program was cut.

Rose then went back to the classroom for three years until she was hired as the arts coordinator at Arthur O. Eve School of Distinction #61: Home of the Arts.

At Arthur O. Eve, Rose writes art integration lessons for the whole school. She also picks the theme of the month for the school and helps teachers write lessons based on the theme of the month. She celebrates art by bringing in featured guests to talk about culture and a type of art while having a craft to go with the celebration. She also arranges fieldtrips to different arts integration places around Buffalo, and co-directs the musical.

"It's a really awesome school, Arthur O. Eve, I love being here," Rose said.

I have had the pleasure and privilege of working as the Director of the Muriel A. Howard Honors Program since Fall 2017. Since that time, the Honors Program has grown from 200 students to over 600. We have built a lovely space in South Wing that provides free printing, a space to gather and connect, do homework and meet in small groups, and get regular snacks :). Bishop Hall has become the location for the Honors Academic Residential Community and our classroom for HON111 and other courses. From a beginning of just me and an Administrative Assistant, we have gained an Honors Advisor and an Assistant Director and lots of campus-level support. These personnel changes have allowed for a more consistent and supportive experience for students and enabled the launch of the Honors Leaders Program. It has been the pinnacle of my career to see more than 650 students graduate from the Honors Program and to have connected with many Honors alumni. SENIOR SPOTLIGHT: Olivia Rodriguez



Decisions can be easy to make but hard to fulfill. Even if we're working towards a dream our path can be difficult, and we might not enjoy the journey. So, why even struggle?

I had an opportunity to sit down and talk to Interior Design senior, Olivia Rodriguez, where we discussed this idea

and more. Olivia is currently working on her senior project that will be presented in Warren Enters Theatre on May 8th.

Arie: What sparked your interest in Interior Design?

Olivia: My mom and I always did projects around the house, just like trying to fix up the house and work on different things. We often tried to tackle things on our own so that got me interested in residential design. Then my dad and I would also go to a lot of different open houses and things like that just for fun. Throughout high school, I also volunteered at a homeless shelter. That also piqued my interest in interior design, but I didn't realize how broad the interior design field was until I came to college.

Arie: What moved you to study at Buffalo State University?

Olivia: Originally, I applied to Buff State as a Business major, and I was going to minor in Interior Design because I did not know that [Interior Design] was a major here. But when I was having that first meeting with Ms. Stevens, she let me know that it was a major, and I ended up switching. I think it's gotten the job done, for sure; it's been a journey. I chose Buff State ultimately because, being from Rochester, it's right down the road; I can still get home, and my parents can still get to me. And it's a good community here.

Arie: What can you tell us about your final senior project?

Olivia: For my final project, I decided to combat the issue of homelessness, focusing in on Buffalo. I'm designing a homeless shelter that not only offers basic necessities, but it also serves as a day center where other people who are not residents at the shelter can come in and use the different services, like case management, legal services, therapy, barber shops and beauty salons. You don't see a lot of that in Buffalo. I feel that obviously it's important to get people off the street, but you're not helping them. So [my project] is focusing on that and researching trauma informed design that focuses on creating spaces that limit triggers that homeless people may have faced.

Arie: What advice do you have for Interior Design majors?

Olivia: I think if anybody wants to do interior design, it needs to be something they're passionate about and they need to be somebody with work ethic. I wish someone told me what I was getting into and that this is not an easy major by any means. It has been the hardest four years of my life. You will not sleep, you'll work on stuff for hours and then you'll go to class, sleep deprived, just for your professor to tell you that it's wrong. I know this is kind of negative, but this is kind of the thing that I wish someone gave me a warning about. I do enjoy it and it's been good, but definitely had its ups and downs for sure. I'm grateful I made it – I didn't think I would.


