

Faculty Spotlight: Mehwish Sarwari

Tell us about your background and professional journey to Buffalo State!

Born and raised in Queens, New York by a single mother and grandmother who came to the United States as refugees from Afghanistan, I've always had an interest in studying global affairs. I attended CUNY Queens College for undergrad and majored in political science with a concentration in international relations. The summer after receiving my B.A., I moved to Buffalo to attend graduate school in political science at the University at Buffalo. I earned my M.A. in 2013 and a Ph.D. in 2016, specializing in international relations and comparative politics.

My journey at Buffalo State University started in 2014 when I began teaching as a part-time instructor while finishing up my graduate degree. I am currently an Assistant Professor of Political Science, the Coordinator of the International Relations B.A. program, and the faculty advisor of the Student Political Society (SPS) club. While the pleasures of teaching, research, and student-oriented extracurriculars fuel most of my day, I also enjoy reading non-academic literature, kickboxing, watching reality tv, and trying new restaurants and cafes.



What are your research interests?

My research focuses on international security, armed conflict, and human rights. I have published articles on these topics in Business and Politics, Conflict Management and Peace Science, Foreign Policy Analysis, Journal of Global Security Studies, Journal of Intervention and Statebuilding, Journal of Peace Research, and Terrorism and Political Violence. I also have an article that is forthcoming in the Journal of Human Rights that is co-authored with a former BSU student. This work examines the effects of international sanctions on wartime sexual violence by state governments.

What do you enjoy about teaching an Honors seminar course?

Teaching HON 202: Data and Global Conflict has been an absolute joy! While I normally teach courses for political science and international relations majors, this course has been a wonderful experience in that the students come from different academic majors. Their unique perspectives and backgrounds make for enjoyable and thought-provoking course discussions. Some students have even taken it upon themselves to conduct research linking topics studied in their major to explain conflict onset and outcomes. This type of intellectual curiosity makes my job as an instructor a rewarding one.

Describe your dream Honors course to teach if given infinite funding and resources.

If given access to infinite funding, it would be awesome if I could organize field trips where we travel to post-conflict countries, including Peru, Mozambique, and Tajikistan, just to name a few. Students would have the opportunity to learn about the history of these areas and the initiatives taken to promote long-lasting peace. While learning about war through academic literature is undoubtedly valuable, visiting areas once impacted by conflict can help bring the theories learned in the classroom to life.

What advice would you give your current students?

Bengals, remember who you are, why you're here, and what skills you need to reach your career and personal goals. Everyone has a unique story to tell. I encourage you to remind yourself what yours is and what you hope your future chapters will look like. Take advantage of all that BSU and the local Buffalo community have to offer to help you become the best version of yourself. Pick up new skills and knowledge by registering for classes on topics you may be unfamiliar with. Attend campus events and meet new people. Find a local organization to volunteer with. While your time at BSU is only one chapter of your life, make it an amazing one. Go Bengals!

ORDER IN THE COURT



First-year students in HON 101 Mock Trial dedicated hours this Fall learning the numerous components and procedures involved in a standard court case. Led by Professor David Ben-Merre, Chair of the English Department, the class chose roles ranging from legal counsel to witnesses and played out a realistic civil trial set in the fictional U.S. state of "Midlands." This year's case centered around the "slayer statute" with the plaintiff accusing a sibling of being a "culpable actor" in their father's death and therefore eligible to inherit the vast wealth.

The Honors Program has offered Mock Trial since Fall 2019 as an experiential first-year seminar where students can apply their new understanding of court procedures in real time. Students often enter the course with no prior knowledge on the subject, but quickly grow confidence in their abilities to dissect evidence and affidavits, formulate legal arguments, make objections and respond to them, and much more. Students who play witness roles are also encouraged to flex their acting skills by dressing in-character and improvising realistic details during questioning. After this semester, students have the opportunity to join the Buffalo State mock trial competition team to face teams from other institutions.

BABEL AUTHOR TALKS

Honors students visited the nearby Kleinhans Music Hall twice this Fall to attend BABEL author talks. In October, first-year students reading *The House*

On Mango Street in HON 111 had the opportunity to hear author Sandra Cisneros. speak about her inspiration for the book and share several pieces aloud, including an unpublished poem. Then in November, seniors in HON 444 were able to meet Tommy Orange, author of *There There* and *Wandering Stars*. Orange's work focuses on the Native American identity, touching on various aspects of this culture, such as intergenerational trauma, heritage, and storytelling.

Organized by the Just Buffalo Literary Center, the BABEL lecture series offers the exciting opportunity for readers and writers to meet bestselling authors right in Buffalo. "Hearing Tommy Orange speak about indigenous culture provided valuable insight for all attendees, whether you are a lover of literature, or simply a connoisseur of the arts," writes Honors student Taylor Krajnik. In Spring, authors Cheryl Strayed and James McBride will be giving BABEL talks.
