

Many students participated in study abroad programs, internships, and athletic competitions during the winter break. And many, of course, got a much-needed rest.

#### FALL 2024 HONORS FACTS

-As of Fall 2024, the Honors Program officially surpassed 600 students.

-25 students joined the Honors Program as continuing or transfer students.

-82% of our 200 first-year Honors students finished their first semester with at least a 3.0 GPA.

-67% of all Honors students achieved a Dean's Honors List term GPA of at least 3.5. As the Spring 2025 semester began, it was great getting to see new and familiar faces at recent events such as Honor's ice skating, chess night, Valentine's Day crafts, and planetarium night. And on February 13<sup>th</sup>, 2025, many Honors students were recognized and celebrated at the School of Arts and Sciences (SAS) Dean's List Reception.

You apply for a very competitive internship, but you get turned down. Then you build up the courage to try again... this time you succeed, and you get your dream internship!

Leanna Tse did just that to get an internship at Brookhaven National Laboratory on Long Island, NY. Tse is a senior Honors student who majors in electrical engineering technology.

The Brookhaven National Laboratory is an extremely competitive internship. The application involves an essay on why you would be a good fit for the internship and a typical internship application as well. Tse applied twice, being denied the first time and getting the opportunity the second time.

Tse said this was a new opportunity for her and described it as "a once in a lifetime experience."

"When I did get into it, I was really impressed and really enjoyed my time there," Tse said.

For the first five days, Tse toured the lab facilities and classroom spaces. Then she spent time networking with professionals in her career field, learning how government research facilities work, and learning from the experts she met.

The main takeaways for Tse were the research experience and being able to learn and see the behind the scenes.

Tse advises students who want to take a shot at a competitive opportunity like this one to have an open mind, expect everything, and to not be too shy and closed off but to use this experience to help advance your career.

imberly Hart, Associate Professor, is a cultural and visual anthropologist. She teaches a rotation of several different Honors seminar courses, each informed by her own research experiences. Her dissertation work was on a women's carpet weaving project, marriage, and the politics of gender and labor in a Turkish village. This work informs her class, HON202 Global Marriage Practices. In 2012, Hart curated an exhibit for Koç University's Research Center for Anatolian Civilizations (ANAMED) in Istanbul titled, "What Josephine Saw." Another exhibit, also about Josephine Powell's photographic works in Turkey 1960s-1980s, was exhibited for the Erimtan Museum in Ankara in 2015. These exhibits, as well as the exhibit she had at Buffalo State in 2018 on the street animals of Istanbul the result of a year of street photography - inform her class, HON202 Visual Anthropology. informs much of her teaching, especially as it relates to empathy and compassion, charity and good deeds. This work is related in part to her HON201 Anthropology of Food class to be offered again in Fall 2025. In turn, interest in these issues relates to her recent research project on the street animals of Istanbul, funded by Fulbright, the UUP, and TUBITAK the Scientific and Technical Research Council of Turkey.

Given Hart's visual orientation in her research it should not be surprising that she also is a visual artist. She has worked in photography, printmaking, and drawing. She is now exploring the medium of oil paint. Most of her imagery is about the relationship between the construction of human and natural worlds, exploring gardens, animals and plants, and urban landscapes.

As part of this program, students participated in service-learning initiatives and worked alongside local teachers and students.
